These churchwardens' accounts are dated 1 January 1554. The date is as the Julian calendar when the year began on 25 March. To our way of looking at it now, the date would therefore have been 1 January 1555./

Mary Tudor came to the throne on 19 July 1553. She was a staunch Roman Catholic and immediately set about reinstating the Roman Catholic faith in England, following the break with Rome during the reign of her father, Henry VIII, and the resolute Protestantism of her brother, Edward VI. These accounts show how the churchwardens at Smarden were returning their parish church to the Roman Catholic ideology./
